### The Zones of Regulation



This term we are introducing a programme called the Zones of Regulation. The Zones of Regulation uses four colours to help children self-identify how they're feeling and categorise it based on colour.

It helps children better understand their emotions, sensory needs, and thinking patterns. They learn different strategies to help them cope and manage their emotions based on which colour zone they are in.

"Zones of regulation is a system to help you get ready for learning. The zones can help you calm down when you feel angry or anxious." GM, 3A

" I am in the yellow zone. To move to green zone, I have to relax and take some time off to calm my mind ." KG, Y4

"I'm very happy in the green zone. I work very hard." AB, RED

"I can move to the green zone by reading or listening music." M-C J 5R.

## **Black London**

Black History Month is always a big celebration and focus for us at St Francis' Catholic Primary School. This year our theme is 'Black London.' Our city is one of the most amazing, historical and culturally diverse on the planet. Many people would assume that there have only been black communities in London since the end of the Second World War and the arrival of the Windrush. But there have been black communities in London for over a thousand years, stretching right back to Roman Britain.

Black History topics have also tended to focus on American Civil Rights and the struggle against Apartheid in South Africa. These are vitally important, worthwhile and interesting topics. However, there is so much Black History right here in our capital city which is often ignored. This year, the children of St Francis' are exploring themes close to home and will realise that there is Black History all around them. Children also emulated the artwork of young up and coming black artists based in London and performed a dub track, an authentically London music style that grew out of reggae in the 1960s and 70s.
