The Greatest Commandment

²⁸ One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?"

The most important one," answered Jesus, "is this: 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. [a] 30 Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' [5] There is no commandment greater than these."

³² "Well said, teacher," the man replied. "You are right in saying that God is one and there is no other but him. ³³ To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and with all your strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself is more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices."

³⁴ When Jesus saw that he had answered wisely, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." And from then on no one dared ask him any more questions.

As we struggle with so many commitments and responsibilities, we too ask the same question as the scribe, 'Which of the commandments is the first of all?' What should be first in my list of priorities, what is my most important duty? Jesus' reply is simple, no wonder they did not dare ask him any further; let his reply echo in your heart, asking for the grace to understand what it means to put love as our highest priority.

These ratings are in place to support parents in deciding what may be appropriate for their children to watch. Our children's brains are still forming and soaking in information based on the things around them including the programs they watch. It is important that as a parent, you are aware of what your children are watching and the impact that it may have on their well-being. Equally, children are likely to share the content of what they watch with their peers at school which of course has an impact on children whose parents have not given the same permission. We would not expect primary school children to be viewing this content; most importantly we do not expect them to discuss it with other children in school.
