Holy Week

Holy Week is the most sacred week of the liturgical year in Christianity, during which the last week of Jesus' life is remembered. Here at St Francis' our children had the opportunity to share their understanding of the events of the arrest, suffering and death of Jesus through drama, music, readings and prayers.

Year 3 began the week's assembly with a dramatization of Palm Sunday which commemorated Christ's triumphant arrival in Jerusalem to the cheers of the crowd.

This was followed by **Year 4** sharing the events of the Last supper where Jesus established the ceremony known as The Eucharist. Jesus' betrayal and arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane as well as Peter's denial was

re-enacted by Year 5.

Year 6 completed the events of Holy week with a journey through the Stations of the Cross where they remembered the events which took place on the road to Calvary.





The Year 1 children used their wonderful singing and acting skills to show us the real reasons for Easter. The children performed 'Jesus is Alive' which tells the story of Jesus and His disciples during Holy Week. We see the triumphant entry into the Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the Last Supper and finally the exciting climax of the play: Jesus' resurrection.

Design & Technology Day

St Francis' had its first Design and Technology Day this term. Every year group looked at a different aspect of DT, ranging from mechanics to textiles. We linked our various DT projects with our History lessons. In Year 1, they created moving pictures using sliders and levers depicting key events in the life of Pirate Queen Grace O'Malley. Year 2 learnt about axels when making replicas of 17th Century fire engines; the type used to battle the Great Fire of London. Year 3 and 4 learnt about different kinds of structures and used this knowledge to make model Greek temples and Egyptian sarcophaguses. Year 5 designed and created a Viking Longship, while Year 6 brushed up on their sewing and embroidery skills to design a belt that would be useful for a 1940s air raid warden. The children had a wonderful day and truly showed their awesome creative skills. We may have some future engineers and designers in our midst!



Disability Awareness Day



This year, the Junior Leadership Team has worked closely with our Head Teacher to organise a Disability Awareness Day! The aim of our Disability Day was to educate our school about disabilities; the effect they have on people with them and how we should be respectful and cordial to those with disabilities. On March 17th, as parents may remember, children were asked to add a purple item to their uniform to show courtesy to people with disabilities as purple represents people and their disabilities. In addition, the Junior Leadership Team chose a disability charity called Disability Rights UK to work jointly with, throughout our Disability Day. Along with the purple item, children were requested to bring £1 which was donated to our chosen charity. Finally, each year group learnt about a different disability and the effects and impacts of them.
